

that integrates aspects of these six models

THE QUADRILATERAL David W. Bebbington

- 1. Conversionism—"the belief that lives need to be changed"
- 2. Biblicism—"belief that all spiritual truth is to be found in its pages"
- 3. Activism—dedication of all believers, including laypeople, to lives of service for God, especially as manifested in evangelism (spreading the good news) and mission (taking the gospel to other societies)
- 4. Crucicentrism—the conviction that Christ's death was the crucial matter in providing atonement for sin (i.e., providing reconciliation between a holy God and sinful humans.

• Believed in Xenoglossalia



- Sep 1906 | Apostolic Faith Newsletter goes to print



EVANGELICALISM

a definition

An evangelical is a good news person—one who believes in the vital value of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ; individual regeneration by the Holy Spirit; and the mission to spread and live this message.

a description

- Evangelicals as a group are a broad collective.
- They navigate and adapt to particular historical moments and cultural shifts, while attending primarily to the above values.
- They are commonly on the side of aiding the downtrodden, disadvantaged, or discriminated of society.
- Seeking revival is a motif for evangelicals.
- and they commonly leverage technology and media to accomplish this aim.
